Please remember to check your medication supplies to ensure you have sufficient to last you during the upcoming bank holiday periods.



The Buntingford & Puckeridge Medical are providing record numbers of appointments.

In the 12 weeks to 24th March 2024, we achieved:

29,981 face to face appointments

14,892 appointments with a GP

19,459 appointments on the same day

And our reception teams received 22,251 telephone calls

Booking an appointment

Consultations with Doctors, Nurses and Health Care Assistants are by appointment only and are normally for ten minutes. Longer consultations may be arranged when appropriate.

Surgeries are normally between 08.30 and 11.30 and 15.00 to 17.00. There are also surgeries available in the evenings.

An appointment is for one person only - where another member of the family needs to be seen or discussed, another appointment should be made.

We encourage you to see the **same** doctor (Usual GP) for an on-going problem to get the best care.

MEDICALLY URGENT - PLEASE CALL BETWEEN 8.30 - 9.30 in the morning

Medically urgent problems will always be seen the same day. You will be asked for some details of your condition to clinically triage and direct you to the most appropriate clinician which may include a GP, Nurse Practitioner or Clinical Pharmacist. These can be face to face or telephone appointments.

ROUTINE APPOINTMENTS - PLEASE CALL AFTER 10.00

Routine appointments can be booked up to 6 weeks in advance and can be face to face or telephone.

CANCELLATIONS

If you cannot attend an appointment for any reason, please inform us as soon as possible in order for us to give the slot to someone else.

PHARMACY FIRST

The new Pharmacy First service, launched 31 January 2024, adds to the existing consultation service and enables community pharmacies to complete episodes of care for 7 common conditions following defined clinical pathways.

The following table shows the 7 conditions pharmacists can manage across various age ranges.

Clinical pathway	Age range
Acute otitis media*	1 to 17 years
Impetigo	1 year and over
Infected insect bites	1 year and over
Shingles	18 years and over
Sinusitis	12 years and over
Sore throat	5 years and over
Uncomplicated urinary tract infections	Women 16-64 years

^{*} Distance selling pharmacies will not complete consultations for acute otitis media.

Patients will be able to access the 7 clinical pathways element via referrals from referring organisations including general practice, urgent and emergency care settings, and NHS 111 (online and via telephone). In addition, for the 7 common conditions clinical pathway consultations only, patients can access the service by attending or contacting the pharmacy directly without the need for referral.



Childhood Asthma


Why is it so hard to breathe?

What is the Shingles National Immunisation Programme?

Vaccination to help protect against shingles is available for free to eligible individuals on the NHS. This programme is referred to as the Shingles National Immunisation Programme.

The Shingles National Immunisation Programme has Changed

On the 1st of September 2023, the Shingles National Immunisation Programme changed, and more individuals are now eligible for a free shingles vaccination on the NHS.

You are now eligible if you're:

- 50 years and over with a severely weakened immune system (severely immunocompromised)
 - · Those aged 18-49 receiving a stem cell transplant may also be eligible. Speak to your specialist.
- Turning 65 years old You'll be eligible from your 65th birthday
- 70 79 years of age

Eligibility Q&A

I'm 65 already - will I be eligible for vaccination?

If you turned 65 before 1st September 2023, you'll be eligible for your free vaccination when you turn 70.

How do I get my shingles vaccination?

Once you become eligible your GP surgery should reach out to you and invite you for vaccination. If you are eligible and worried that you may have missed your shingles vaccination, contact your GP surgery to arrange an appointment.

I'm 80 years (or older) - am I eligible for vaccination?

If you're 80 years or older you should have already received your shingles vaccination. If you haven't received your vaccination, you are no longer eligible. If you're unsure about your vaccination status, contact your GP surgery to check.

My 65th birthday is next year (2024), when will I be eligible?

You will become eligible on your 65th birthday. Your GP surgery should have systems in place to identify patients when they become eligible for shingles vaccination and should reach out to you.

How do I know if I have a medical condition or if I'm taking medication which might cause a severely weakened immune system (severely immunocompromised)?

You can learn more about eligibility for individuals with a severely weakened immune system here.

You can also check this with your nurse, GP surgery or specialist doctor.

Worried about Cervical Screening?

Cervical screening tests for human papillomavirus (HPV).

HPV is very common. Most people will get the virus at some point in their life. It is spread through close skin to skin contact during any type of sexual contact. There are many different types of HPV, some types can cause abnormal cell changes, but only some types can lead to cancer, these types do not cause any symptoms. In most cases, your immune system can get rid of the virus without you ever knowing you had it.

Sometimes HPV can stay in the body for many years at undetectable levels without causing any problems. This is called 'dormant' HPV.

Dormant HPV can become active and is then found at screening. This means the HPV infection can become active again years after you have it. HPV can cause abnormal cell changes in your cervix.

Your cervix is the lowest part of your uterus (or womb), and it is found at the top of your vagina.

Your body can usually get rid of the abnormal cells and your cervix returns to normal. But sometimes this doesn't happen, and the abnormal cells can go on to develop into cancer. This is usually a slow process taking over 10 years.


Going for cervical screening when invited is the best way to protect yourself against cervical cancer. It is your choice whether to have a cervical screening test or not. This leaflet will help you decide whether to have the test and provide more information about HPV and cervical cancer.

The work of the Community Assembly: Our Year in Review

Launched in September 2021 the Community
Assembly for the East and North Herts Health
and Care Partnership has grown from
strength to strength with a strong cohort of
patient, voluntary and community, NHS and
social care representatives working together
to jointly set the agenda so that issues of
concern to patients can be heard.

Chaired and managed by Healthwatch
Hertfordshire as an independent patient
champion the assembly is involved with
the partnership's strategic direction and
provides a collaborative forum for a broad
range of voices within communities who
want to help shape and improve local
health and care services.

As the NHS continues to transform, the Assembly has explored some key issues and heard about some exciting initiatives all aimed at improving patient experience, including:

An insightful overview of some exciting district level partnership initiatives targeted at improving health in their local areas. Focussed on place-based health inequalities they gave examples of their work including a Homelessness Project in East Herts and a Mental Health in Young People Project in Stevenage. You can listen to some young people talking about their 5 Ways to Wellbeing framework here.

Hospital at Home - where using a Lived Experience Advisory Panel helped the partnership to find ways of looking after patients safely in their own home by avoiding hospital admission or allowing for quicker hospital discharge. The model helps to speed up recovery whilst freeing up hospital beds. Read more about it here.

The Outpatient Transformation
Programme including the
introduction of Patient Initiated
Follow-up Pathways (PIFU) for
some patients to initiate
appointments if and when
needed and the new Patient
Engagement Portal (PEP) which
is a new way for patients to
receive information about
appointments and treatment
with re-designed pathways and
streamlined contact centre
processes.

The new Heart Failure Service enables patients with heart failure to be monitored closer to home and benefit from earlier identification, diagnosis and management of their condition. Patients have access to a consultant cardiologist and specialist nurses working alongside community nurses, care providers and hospices and the new direct access echocardiogram pathway.

"I'm pleased to be one of the first to be part of a **virtual ward**for heart failure. The programme provides the reassurance of
being closely monitored with the **convenience of being at**home, not having to travel for hospital appointments."

Developments in **Primary Care** covering GP Access, pharmacy, optometry and dentistry. Examples include empowerment through GP self-referral and access to records, telephony upgrades and the new wider role of <u>'Pharmacy First'</u> launched on 31st January 2024. New clinical pathways for this service include sinusitis, insect bites, shingles, UTIs, impetigo, sore throats and acute otitis media.

Patient Engagement Forum (PEF)

September 2023 saw the launch of a new Patient Engagement Forum for the Herts and West Essex Integrated Care Board and the Chair of PEF, Alan Bellinger provides regular updates to the Assembly about their work, with contributions from patient reps Mike Carn and Claire Uwins.

Having an advisory role, networking is key to the group and bringing the patient voice to the Integrated Care Board. PEF and the Board have together identified a programme of 14 key issues and will be focussing on some 'deep dive' areas including GP practices, patient choice and urgent and emergency care.

Way Forward

Health and Care Partnerships - April 2024

One of four partnerships across the system, the East and North Herts Health and Care Partnership (ENHHCP) will have a clear plan of action to enable the delivery of a future operating model. This will be overseen by the Integrated Care System (ICS) and monitored by the Integrated Care Board (ICB). The plan has four work streams:

- · delivering system priority programmes of work
- · developing financial arrangements and reporting
- · reviewing governance arrangements and
- defining a longer-term vision and ambition.

There is a huge opportunity for the Community Assembly to influence and inform priorities of the partnership. As we move towards the Health and Care Partnership model in April it is so important to have the patient voice at all levels.

Community Assembly Attendance is now well established with a core and growing group who attend on a regular basis. Our PPG representatives have a powerful impact on the group as will the new Patient Engagement Forum, but we still want to broaden our reach in terms of diversity and representation to include, for example, more community and faith groups, people from seldom heard communities and more Council representation.
