Newsletter – February 2020

LMC Meeting 10th February 2020

At our last LMC meeting we discussed a range of issues in addition to the newsletter articles here including: Hospital Discharge Letter, Community Phlebotomy and Social Prescribing.

Ongoing discussions continue around intermediate care and reablement, with concerns about transfer of work to GPs having been voiced to the CCG.

LMC suggested changes to this year's Quality Contract have been accepted on the whole and it has been agreed that the DVT LES should remain outside of the basket LES until there has been further evaluation, as well as a further update from NICE expected later this year. Discussions have already started for next year's Quality Contract with more sweeping reforms expected.

Health checks

The LMC met with Parkwood to discuss any problems or issues with the current health checks. Overall numbers still appear low when compared to historical activity, although reassured we are that figures have January dramatically improved. Issues included raised overly cumbersome and lengthy

forms (self-referral process being the preferred option) anecdotal overestimates of cholesterol levels with near patient testing and CVD risks over 10% not being properly signposted to see GP for further discussion, as well as ones under 10% being advised to see their GP.

GPC England contract negotiations

GPC England have agreed to accept the changes to the GP contract for 2020-21, including funding to attract more doctors to take up partnership roles and expand the practice team seeing patients in surgeries.

The main changes are:

- The new value of Global Sum from 1st April will be £93.46.
- The new value of a QOF point will be £194.83.

More roles added to the Additional Roles Reimbursement Scheme.

- Between 2020/21 and 2023/24, the scheme will expand to 26,000 additional roles.
- All roles to be reimbursed at 100%, freeing up the existing £1.50/head to contribute to management support for PCNs.

• Funding entitlements increase from $\pounds 257m$ to $\pounds 430m$ next year and, in 2023/24, from $\pounds 891m$ to $\pounds 1,412m$.

- Extra investment will fund new GP training, recruitment and retention measures with £20,000 plus training support for every new partner.
- Payment arrangements for vaccinations and immunisations to be reformed with an item of service fee for childhood vaccinations, beginning with MMR in 2020/21.
- QOF to be updated.
- PCN service specifications significantly reduced and improved.
- Investment and Impact Fund introduced worth £40.5m in 2020/21.

• Taken together, more funding available at practice level.

The GPC advise that CCGs will be expected to provide LMCs with an annual report to enable them to monitor local investment in general practice. There is also reference to the important role of LMCs throughout the agreement document.

Better, Fitter, Sooner.

Whilst we understand this is the situation we have to deal with, the LMC don't agree with the sentiment that this is based on prevention and we still think this amounts to rationing of healthcare due to lack of funding, rather than clinical necessity.

Patient feedback on LESs.

This was discussed at the last Primary Care Committee. There were various discussions around the review of the proposals regarding the escalation process in relation to nonparticipation of the LES survey.

The LMC view is that signing up to the LESs doesn't require any level of activity; particularly for minor operations. Any letters from the CCG about this should be referred to the LMC.

Safeguarding & Red Whale

Although we're all interested in safeguarding training there may be some confusion about the new requirements! In recent communications, Red Whale are implying that training is a requirement.

Their advice remains that while there is no obligation to provide this information, unless the Secretary of State issues a direction, they would encourage practices to respond so that NHSEI and Public Health England are aware the national picture for preparations.
